# **SUMMARY OF PURPOSE**

The Bambino Gesù Children's Hospital Research Institute (Rare and Genetic Diseases Unit) has designed, implemented and evaluated an Empowerment Intervention and best practice to ensure inclusion of persons living with a rare disease: Williams Syndrome.

Williams Syndrome is characterized by a combination of distinguishing physical traits, congenital anomalies, intellectual disabilities, and a specific developmental profile.

Few scientific studies address interventions aimed to improve quality of life of adult Williams Syndrome individuals.

## **METHODOLOGY**

Our Williams Syndrome patients ages 25-30 have adequate cognitive, cultural and social skills.

Workplace is located in the Hospital Playroom and the Administration office of the Department of Rare Diseases. Activity plan was devised into steps and with specific goals, taking into consideration the peaks and valleys of Williams Syndrome and the specific personality of our patients.



### **OBJECTIVES**

- ☐ To develop patient's self awareness of their internal and external resources to effectively use them and increase self-efficacy;
- ☐ To plan work activities to guide and facilitate work environment improving patient self-management skills;
- ☐ Supporting patient to improve their quality of life, to live as independently as possible and to develop their ability to self-care.

### CONCLUSIONS

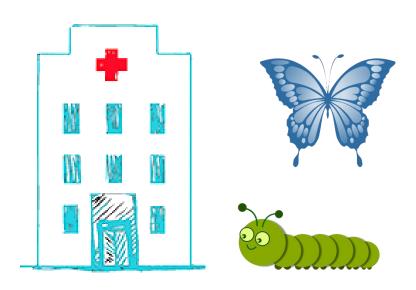
